

At the AGM on the 1<sup>st</sup> March 2021, after three years serving U3A Rockhampton, I, together with a number of my management committee members, will be stepping down from our roles and will not be re-nominating for any committee positions.

I have been fortunate to have such a hard-working progressive management team, and collectively we have achieved many things for the U3A Rockhampton membership. There is now an opportunity for other progressive U3A members to step up and take U3A Rockhampton to the next level.

Some committee members who have not completed their three years will be able to assist new committee members to transition into their new roles.

# Management committee achievements over the last three years?

#### Membership

• We have progressively grown our membership since 2018. Prior to the pandemic our numbers were pushing towards the 500 mark. The inability to hold general meetings, because of the Covid restrictions, has certainly taken a toll on those membership numbers. Although we have only recently recommenced general meetings, we are again receiving many new applications.

#### **Guest Speakers, Events and Outings**

- 2018 we had 9 guest speakers and 13 outings and functions
- 2019 we had 9 guest speakers and 12 outings and functions
- 2020 we had 1 guest speaker and 2 outings and functions (everything was impacted by the Covid-19 Pandemic from March 2020)
- 2021 we had 1 guest speaker for March and 1 guest speaker and 3 outings & functions planned to April 2021
- In addition, we organised the 30 year celebrations and conducted a Volunteers Morning Tea each year in order to thank our volunteers for their contribution to U3A Rockhampton.

#### **Re-commencement of Activities**

Covid-19 has presented U3A Rockhampton with some major challenges in getting activities restarted safely. Locations for activities were visited and Covid Safe Plans and Risk Assessments were developed for review and approval by the management committee.

The safety management sub-committee and the management committee have assisted 15 activities restart with more potentially able to restart soon.

This task has been made difficult with relentless undermining of the Safety Management Policy and Procedures by undermining and denigrating the management committee and safety management subcommittee by a few of members, whose end game is to have safety management removed from U3A Rockhampton.

#### Safety

 In 2019, after a number of safety related incidents and considering the demographics of our membership, it became apparent that U3A Rockhampton needed to pick its game up in relation to a proactive safety policy to ensure the safety and wellbeing of our members. We also found that we were lagging as much as 10 years behind other good Queensland U3A's in introducing safety management policy and procedures.

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- In 2020 U3A members voted in favour of having a safety policy and a safety management subccommittee consisting of three management committee members and four other members was formed to develop the necessary safety policies and procedures, forms and training packages.
- Two U3A members who are trained First Aiders have been provided with a St Johns First Aid kit and defibrillator.
- Outdoor activity groups have been provided with small First Aid kits for their use.
- Members of the safety management subcommittee are available to visit venues and assist coordinators with the preparation of Risk Assessments and Covid Safe Plans.
- The safety management sub-committee conducted a presentation on safety management and completing risk assessments on 24 September 2020 for the benefit of the activity coordinators.
- Activity groups which have restarted have been provided with Covid sanitising cleaning kits and hand sanitiser.

#### Covid-19

- After March 2020 Covid 19 presented special issues in the management of U3A Rockhampton.
- The management committee continued to function by holding meetings with Zoom.
- The Zoom membership was extended to the activity groups. The Ukulele group used Zoom successfully to continue its activity.

#### Administration

- All U3A Rockhampton financial reporting is computerised and almost all payments are now paid by EFT.
- Position descriptions have had the roles and responsibilities updated to reflect what the management committee members actually do.
- A handbook "Guidelines for Coordinators" has been developed, reviewed and approved for 2020. This is new for U3A Rockhampton, but has been available at other U3A's throughout Queensland and elsewhere for many years. This book will provide the necessary guidelines to assist our coordinators.
- In June 2019 U3A Rockhampton Constitution was updated to meet current standards including removing discriminatory age requirement and allowing the use of technology for meetings. The By-Laws were updated in October 2020.\_\_

- Website updated with all the latest documents, forms, activity sheets, etc. Every U3A Rockhampton document a member needs is available to everyone and is in one place.
- Facebook page continually updated with relevant information and photographs that relate to U3A Rockhampton.
- Throughout the pandemic in 2020 two "Isolation Newsletters" were sent out to keep our members updated and informed.
- Quarterly Flyers have been published quarterly and sent to our members.
- The old "Show and Tell" in December and the "Sign on Day" in February have been consolidated into one event called "Activities Expo" which is held in February.
- Our older computers have been updated to Windows 10 and Office and can be loaned out to our members wanting to attend computer classes and practice at home.

#### Grants

We have applied for various grants and have received \$13,585.00 in grants for the purchase of equipment for the benefit of U3A Rockhampton.

- The old name badge design has been discontinued and we order only badges with the official U3A logo

#### **CQU Student Awards**

• The bursary for the CQU Students Awards has been increased to \$1000.00. I have attended every Students Awards Ceremony to represent U3A Rockhampton.

#### **U3A Network**

• Myself or a representative have attended all U3A Network Queensland AGM's and North Queensland Presidents Councils

At the conclusion of 2020, I took the opportunity to reflect on CQUniversity's many achievements, despite the challenges that COVID-19 presented. From transitioning all Higher Education and VET courses to online learning, hosting online events for staff and students, providing financial and meal assistance to students who faced significant financial hardship, continued sponsorship and support of our community events including the CQUniversity Village Festival and so much more!

CQUniversity Rockhampton had the privilege of hosting its December graduation ceremony. This was not only a great celebration of achievement but the first major event that CQUniversity held in 2020 since the introductrion of COVID-19 social distancing measures. With almost 400 graduates, the day was split into two COVID safe events at the CQUniversity Community Sports Centre

Chancellor John Abbott AM presented more than 170 students in the morning ceremony followed by 212 students in the afternoon with their official Testamur. A total of 7 PhD graduates were also recognised for their achievements.

Graduates and guests were treated to inspirational words of wisdom by our talented, local guest speakers Ms Marni McGrath and Ms Heather Peirano. Lucinda Brown, Bachelor of Education graduate and Darian Wooler, Bachelor of Nursing graduate delivered the response on behalf of all graduates.

Two Associate Vice-President Rockhampton Region Medals were also awarded at the ceremonies. The Associate Vice-President's Region Medal is presented to a student who not only demonstrates a strong commitment to their studies, but also includes contributions to community, capacity to act as a mentor to others, ability to respond to challenge and a commitment to the value of cultural diversity. The two recipients of the Associate Vice-President's medal were Master of Engineering (Electrical) graduate Mr Jeet Mukherjee and Bachelor of Nursing graduate Ms Darian Lee Wooler.

Both graduates not only excelled academically, but also immersed themselves into campus life and culture. They volunteered their time as student mentors and ambassadors by attending many events on and off campus as well as online. Darian and Jeet are proud CQUniversity graduates who will now take what they have learnt and apply it to their prospective professions. I look forward to fostering the next intake of students through their academic and university experience.

#### It is not over yet

Now for a more pleasant subject. Who can remember using dial up Internet when if the modem was on the telephone line you couldn't make an outside call. To overcome this I had two Telstra lines, one for the phone and one for the modem and this number was not listed. Modems started at 300bauds and went up to 56K bauds. So if you had a 28K modem 2megs of data took 720 seconds to download.

Today with NBN we could hardly notice the time it takes to load a page or to download a program it generally happens in a few seconds. However the Australian NBN FTTN is rated at 61 in the world and Wireless is rated at 5 in the world

At home you can carry out a speedtest on your connection, click or copy this link into your Web browser <u>https://www.speedtest.net</u> when it loads click GO. Mine was 45.28mbps down and 10.96mbps up. The Australian ave is 58.3mbps down and 21.4mbps up. **mbps = mega bits per second** 

Covid19 has affected the down time on sites because of the increased number of people trying to access the sites. If you are having trouble accessing a site use this link to see what sites are having trouble <u>https://downdetector.com.au</u> and what sites are down.

If you use **MyGov** you will find it has many issues and outages. Using downdetector you can click on the MyGov button and see who else is having problems. #### Rodger Williamson's Story Leaving England

I was excited. We were going to join Dad and Peter in Australia.

My excitement had nothing to do with Australia, Australia was just a name, a place to be found in an atlas. It was the place where Dad was now living. My excitement, was that we were going on a large boat and that we would be living on it for four weeks. This was an adventure like never before!

Already a large red truck had called to Grandma Dale's house in Hull. Two men had loaded numerous items including two large chests which Mum called Cabin Trunks and upon which, was stencilled in large letters, "Not wanted on Voyage." The bold writing emblazoned upon the truck "Speed it Thru Stevens" told me, and anyone who cared to look, that a great undertaking was about to begin.

Two days later, Mum and I boarded the train at Paragon Station and left our East Yorkshire homeland for London. As the landscape rolled by, my excitement grew even more. Mother had booked us into a Central London Hotel! This was a new experience for me because I had never been in a hotel before. Never mind going to sleep in one!. I felt very important as we entered the polished marble foyer where men in smart red uniforms, raced to take our luggage and to guide us to a counter at which sat a bespectacled lady who greeted us like toffs.

Up till now, my infrequent stays away from our home in Willerby had been spent in Bridlington with Grandma Williamson, or in Hull with Grandma Dale. We were to stay in London for two nights, before leaving on another train which was to take us to a place called Tilbury.

We only had the one room and after settling in I was soon asleep in the big double bed.

The next day we went sight-seeing. For me, the most important sight to see was the Changing of the Guard at Buckingham palace. This proved to be a small disappointment. The Guards were in their grey winter uniforms rather than the storybook bright red.

Holding Mother's hand, we walked the busy streets looking into shops and dodging the many pedestrians - all who seemed to be in a hurry. We eventually entered a big posh store called Harrods. Mum told me that my Aunty Vicky worked there. Looking around, Mam (a Yorkshire term for Mum) couldn't find her sister so she enquired at one of the counters displaying beauty products etc. "Excuse me" she said "I'm looking for Vicky Dale, I thought that she worked on these counters." The woman looked perplexed, trying to put a face to a fellow assistant who spoke with a broad Northern accent. 'You say her name is Dale" she asked as if to clarify a face in her mind. Suddenly her face lit up, it was as if a light was turned on "Oh!" She said in a condescending tone "You must mean Miss Dauville."

Aunty Vicky had been ashamed of her broad Yorkshire accent and so had cultivated a name and accent to suit the wealthy clientele shopping at Harrods. She received a right telling off from Mam who let her know that Northerners were every bit as good – if not better than her stuck-up work mates and the posh clientele who could afford "*Aarrods*" prices.

The next day came and we lugged our heavy suitcases down to the foyer where (Against Mothers dislike for paying taxi fares) we were taken to a Central London railway station. I would like to think that it was Kings Cross but, in all truth, I can't remember which one. The exciting part for me was that we were going to catch "A Boat Train."

This proved be another to disappointment. The term "Boat- Train" had conjured up all sorts of images in my eight-year olds brain. But it was only another steam train and carriages. Further more, it was only a short 40-minute journey down the Thames to Tilbury Docks.

The train pulled up in front of a long passengers hurriedly started shed and marshalling their luggage before walking off towards the wide open doors of the awaiting shed. Almost staggering under the weight of the suitcase allocated to my responsibility It was sometime before I realized what lay before me. There towering over the shed was the biggest, most wonderful ship that I had ever seen.

Walking up the gangway we were greeted by a Steward who directed us to our cabin. Once again, I was to share with Mother in our little two berth cabin.

Once settled, we made our way to join what seemed like hundreds of others the outer deck. Leaning on the rail we watched the embarkation process of a liner preparing to break its ties to the land.

An excited murmur broke out as a gap of water became visible between the ship and shore. Then suddenly, with an ear splitting roar which made everyone jump with consternation the ship made three blasts of its mighty fog horns and all connection to old England was broken. 
