At the conclusion of 2021, I took the opportunity to reflect on CQUniversity's many achievements, despite the challenges that COVID-19 continued to present. Continuing online learning for all Higher Education and VET courses, hosting online events for staff and students, providing financial and meal assistance to students who faced significant financial hardship, continued sponsorship and support of our community events including the CQUniversity Village Festival and so much more!

In the final few months of 2021, a new partnership was established between CQUniversity, Aircraft Australia and the Mackay Airport with the aim of enhancing flight training and air travel services in the Mackay region. Through the partnership, CQUniversity Mackay aviation students will have pathway opportunities to have a career with newcomer Aircraft Australia at Mackay Airport.

Rockhampton CQUniversity TAFE Conservation and Land Management students also had the amazing opportunity to practice their land care skills at one of the most idyllic locations in the Central Queensland region, North Keppel Island. During the two-day experience, the group of Certificate III students honed their weed identification skills and learnt about land re vegetation and began putting these principles into action on the Island.

In late 2021, CQUniversity appointed a new Professor to contribute to livestock and animal science research, Professor Simon Quigley. Professor Quigley has a research background in ruminant nutrition and production systems, having worked primarily with beef cattle and more recently with goats and will lead delivery of a new research initiative in Indonesia.

CQUniversity Rockhampton had the privilege of hosting its December graduation ceremony. This was not only a great celebration of achievement but the first major event that CQUniversity held in 2021. With close to 500 graduates, the day was split into two COVID safe events at the CQUniversity Community Sports Centre.

One Associate Vice-President Rockhampton Region Medal was also awarded at the morning ceremony. The Associate Vice-President's Region Medal is presented to a student who not only demonstrates a strong commitment to their studies, but also includes contributions to community, capacity to act as a mentor to others, ability to respond to challenge and a commitment to the value of cultural diversity. The recipient of the Associate Vice-President's medal was

Bachelor of Education (Secondary) graduate Mr Dominic Mappas.



Mr Mappas not only excelled academically, but also immersed himself into campus life and culture. He volunteered his time as a student mentor and ambassador by attending many events on and off campus as well as online. Dominic is a proud CQUniversity graduate who will now take what he has learnt and apply it to his prospective professions. I look forward to fostering the next intake of students through their academic and university experience.

#### What can you do to protect against fraud?

- •Never disclose your login details, PINs, SMS authentication codes to ANYONE.
- •A reputable organisation or financial institution will **NEVER** ask you for this information.
- •Never provide information like account details and credit card numbers over the phone unless you have initiated the call and are satisfied that the phone number you are using is a trusted source.
- •Regularly update your computer and digital devices with security protection such as anti-virus, anti-spyware software and firewalls from a reputable provider.
- •Select a password that is difficult to guess and has no connection to you, is lengthy and contains a mixture of both alphabetical and numeric characters and  $\&^{\%}$  symbols.
- •Beware of pop-ups advising you that you need to fix your computer and can do so by calling a particular number.
  - •Never give a stranger or unsolicited contact remote access to your computer. If you are asked to do this - hang up.
- •If you think the call is legitimate, confirm the identity of the caller.
- •Ask for the person's name and contact details and advise that you will call them back.
- •Once you have hung up, validate their contact details by looking up the organisation's official website and calling the organisation's advertised





- •Never call back on details provided by the caller; if they are a scammer, this number will be false.
- •Do not open suspicious or unusual texts, or click on links or attachments in unsolicited emails.
- •Avoid using computers in public places, such as Internet Cafes or free Wi-Fi
- •Do not undertake financial transactions for people you have not physically met and only have an online relationship.





#### THREE LITTLE KOOKABURRAS

On the afternoon of 26 October 2021 my sister, Margaret, found a tiny kookaburra on the ground near our back fence. On further investigation, and with the assistance of our neighbour, we located two more baby birds.

The big old ironbark on our fence line has been a well-used nesting place for our local kookaburras for some years. On that Tuesday morning however, there had been a storm (27ml) and the base of the termite mud nest had collapsed, with the baby birds falling, I estimated a good ten meters to the ground below.

We put them in a plant hanging basket along with some Spanish moss for comfort, and hung near the original nesting tree. The Spanish moss was a problem. One bird tried to eat it, and the birds were getting it tangled around their legs and body. So we moved them into a hanging wicker basket with more suitable cane mulch as nesting material. The three adult birds fortunately remained in attendance and continued to feed the chicks (immature birds often stay with their parents and help rear and protect the next generation). We were amazed at the fast growth of the Incredibly, after only 25 days, the young garden of a Desert Flower enthusiast. chicks. kookaburras had tested those newly grown wings and taken their first flight, but not too far. They remained in my neighbours' trees, just over the fence, for quite some time. The adults continued to feed the young birds, and teach hunting skills.

So now, after three months, we have the pleasure of having this family of five kookaburras visit almost every afternoon. A joy to see.

Our advice is that baby birds are far better cared for by their parents, if this is possible... This experience is a perfect example as, frankly, I am not as proficient as they are at catching small snakes, mice, and the sundry other delectable morsels that comprise the kookaburra

If you love to travel and haven't been able to for the last couple of years, then why not join our group and see the world through our speakers' eyes.. Our first trip for 2022 will be Turkey.




We normally undertake short exercise while we are together and have an enjoyable exchange of ideas over the allotted two and half hours.

## The following is Alan Watts' contribution to the WFP February topic A SAFE HAVEN

#### **A SAFE HAVEN by Alan Watts**

At the moment, I am at home as a "safe haven" from the Omicron strain of Covid 19. Because of the large number of cases, hospitalisations and deaths of elderly people, I have become very selective in where I go to protect both myself and my wife who has other health issues. In these times, I remember the words of Dorothy from The Wizard of Oz-"There's no place like home".

Being home gives me time to think about the past instead of dwelling on the present and my mind wandered back to a time when I found another safe haven.

It was Australia Day Weekend in 1978. I was 20 years old and it was my first year in living away from home. I had moved from Hervey Bay to Biloela in August 1977 and went home for the long weekend. The other guys living in the bank quarters in Biloela where I lived, went to Keppel Island for the weekend. Most of the girls I worked with came from farm families outside Biloela and went home for the long weekend.

The end of the weekend came and the weather was fine when I left Hervey Bay, but by the time I had passed Torbanlea heading towards Childers, it began raining wind driven hard rain. It was hard to see ahead so I followed the lights of the vehicle in front rather than watching the road ahead.

The further I went, the harder the rain fell. I remember going across the Burnett River over an old wooden bridge with water lapping at the edges. In those days, you went down a hill, across the bridge and up the hill on the other side.

I continued on with my eyes focussed on the tail lights of the vehicle ahead. It was rather scary but what else could I do? I had to get back to Biloela for work the next day (or so I thought).

Finally, I reached the crossroads.

Should I continue

on the Bruce Highway and go to Rockhampton where my sister lived or head straight to Biloela? Would the road be open to Biloela? How safe would it be driving over the range on the Callide Coal Road, a narrow winding road? Would I have someone to follow, as I had on the Bruce Highway? The main Gladstone to Biloela road was closed at that time with all traffic having to take the Coal Road instead.

I decided to risk it and turned off toward Biloela and drove into the township of Calliope. Just past the township, there was a long line of cars. I found there were two creeks to cross. The first one was passable but the second wasn't.

The risk of going through the first one and waiting for the second to go down was maybe the first one may come up and become impassable, then I would be stuck between the two.

It was now late afternoon. A girl I worked with, also there with her parents, advised that there were no motels available in Calliope or Benaraby and that The Calliope Hall would be opened for stranded travellers to sleep overnight. More than just any port in a storm, it was a safe haven for the night.

I decided to attempt getting to Gladstone instead, Being young and bullet-proof, I drove across a flooded creek in my little Datsun 120Y and into town where I bought a takeaway meal. I knew no-one there I could stay with, so now the Calliope Hall seemed to be a more attractive option, than paying to stay somewhere.

Returning to Calliope, crossing the flooded creek, again in the dark, in my little car. I found my own floor space among the many stranded people in the safe haven there.

The following morning, being unable to get back to Biloela, I drove back into Gladstone, crossing the flooded creek once again, and reported for duty at Gladstone branch of the Commonwealth Bank. This was standard procedure in circumstances such as this.

A married woman on staff offered to let me stay at her house until the roads opened. The Bank Manager was having none of that, and insisted that I stay in their single men's quarters with other male staff. Maybe he knew more about her than he let on, or it may have only been how it would look to others, I will never than the government.

I stayed for a couple of days until I heard the road to Biloela had reopened. Driving through water in a number of places, made it back to work. At least crossing the Callide Coal Road was better in daylight without rain, than what it would have been on the day I was scheduled to drive back.

I was not used to getting "the cold shoulder" at work but that was exactly what occurred. All, bar one of the guys who went to Great Keppel Island, had not returned and the girls who went home to their properties were all stranded and unable to get to work. The guy who did get back from Keppel had left early to get his girlfriend back to return to Brisbane where she worked. He took a long way around via Wowan and Banana, as the Rockhampton to Biloela road was also cut.

The branch had opened with a skeleton staff and the boss's wife came in to answer the phone and do some typing etc. Those who made it to work were the "golden girls and boy" the rest of us were made to feel like lepers. The guy who made it back was treated like a saint.

I have never forgotten this weekend where I found a safe haven in the Calliope Hall that night.
