From the desk of Professor Scott Bowman Vice-Chancellor and President

What CQUniversity achieved in 2011 was nothing short of staggering. A highly ambitious set of goals was delivered upon and student numbers grew to the point where we can now be considered Queensland's fastest growing university. Our course offerings expanded dramatically into new areas which will help meet the unique skills needs of each of the communities we serve. Many of our campuses became construction sites as new buildings and major refurbishments went ahead at pace.

We acquired world class research facilities, along with world class researchers, to drive our determined push to become the most engaged research-intensive university in regional Australia.

We equalled our best ever result in the past decade of receiving "five star rankings" — the highest possible ranking - in seven categories in the renowned *Good Universities Guide*, and we were ranked among the top three Queensland Universities in the category of *Teaching Quality*. "Page Five ~ History"

I have received no input for The History Page so I contribute this myself. A very limited look at a rather large & extremely complex subject.



English, we all use it every day; I am writing with it, some may feel they are expert in it. Where did it come from? We need to go back a bit. Britannia, a group of islands between the North Atlantic & the North Sea, was a Celtic land, inhabited by Britons. Considerable trading and raiding from all directions by early seafarers from Europe is well known. A suspected (but not proved) visit in the 5th Century BC by the Phoenicians, lead by Himilco searching for the Cassiterides ~ 'Tin Islands' has not seen any archaeological evidence of subsequent Punic (Phoenician/Carthaginian) trade. On 26th August 56BC we note the arrival of one Julius Caesar on his initial expedition, followed by invasion in 54BC. Romanisation developed and followed its natural course, including introduction of their language, until the separation from Rome in 410AD. The first English arrived in 449AD. Who? The original 'England' was in an area now known as Schleswig-Holstein. A loose confederation of three tribes from Frisia & its neighbouring territories. Angles (the powerful dominant) who lived in the heart of the peninsula between the North Sea & the Baltic, Jutes from further north (Jutland) & Saxons from the south (Holstein) were all regarded as Saxons by the Romans, who only ever encountered the southern tribe & were barely aware of the other two further north. These tribes loosely identified their own League as 'Englishmen'. The indigenous Celts had already coped with the Roman invasion but this time retreated before the Saxons, to hold their ground in Cornwall, Wales, Scotland & Ireland. The remainder of the mainland was now in the hands of the invaders, mainly soldiers and farmers looking for arable land. For the most part they were illiterate, but with them came their rune masters who brought the runic alphabet. Comprising 31 characters, it was common in Europe at the time. Runes were used for practical marking of property (by carving) and often symbolic, decorative & ornamental purposes. They were not used much for writing. That aspect later fell to the Latin alphabet we are quite familiar with, following its arrival with early Christian Missionaries in the late 6th century. The first written work dates from the early 8th century & shows the absorption of Latin words into English, having been adapted to conform to

accepted patterns. Four main settlement groups formed, linguistically related they have been identified in more recent Northumbrian, Mercian, West Saxon & Kentish. The Saxon tribes' influence not only lead finally to the formation of the English language but a few others, such as Swedish, German & Dutch. In the late 8th century came the marauding Vikings. After years of raids they settled in the Midlands ~ the 'Danelaw' & beyond. They introduced many Norse words & expressions over the next 200 years but not many were recorded before historical works dating from c1000-1300; many did not last past the medieval period. 1066, more invaders, the Normans; for the next 300 years the official language was French, although the general population always spoke English. The Gallic influence saw the absorption of an enormous number of French words to replace the old English. Examples: 'King' & 'Queen' are English, 'advise', 'command', 'parliament', 'royalty' & 'sovereign' are French, but most of this influence came not from Paris, but Normandy. Incidentally the Normans were so named, as the 'North Men' originally; Viking invaders, from the north. French was the language at court & in diplomacy. It remained a compulsory school subject in the English Grammar School system into the latter part of the 20th Century. So did Latin, although a student could choose an alternative subject after their first year or so (circa 1960) unless, like me, they wanted to qualify in the sciences; an aspiring botanist or zoologist certainly still needed it. The wide range of very different dialects & accents in England stems from various indigenous tribes, plus this early history of invasion & settlement.

The importation of words from other languages & sources still goes on. From Spanish we have: alligator, banana, potato, tornado, all of which have made it into international English from North America. English Imperial Colonisation in the 17th & 18th centuries brought the language to its other alternate homes in Australia, Canada, New Zealand, South Africa, West Indies & many more, where it is dominant. Each new area has added its own local words (EG: 'corroboree' in Australia) which are now commonly accepted. Air Traffic Control is in English; the whole world uses it, every day.

But I have tea or coffee now, 'cause I can't stand the






