
Christmas Lunch at The Frenchville Sports Club

There are so many different directions SCAMMERS can go to extract your dollars. BE AWARE!

Now some very interesting items I found on the Web at https://www.space.com: I don't think there are many people who haven't gazed into the night sky and wondered what is up there.

At the <u>centre of the Milky Way</u> is a supermassive black hole, surrounded by billions of stars and invisible "<u>dark matter</u>." While in space.com search for "The Milky Way".

I also suggest that you register with PayPal and get yourself an account. It is a very simple process for peace of mind when paying over the Internet.



OUR JOURNEY TO ROCKHAMPTON FROM MY DIARY ENTRIES

Our journey to Rockhampton really began in Port Moresby, PNG. We had obtained Aussie citizenship by virtue of the fact that we had lived and worked in PNG for three years prior to that country receiving their independence.

After spending five weeks sailing back to Blighty and time with friends and family – Dave began looking for employment and soon became thoroughly disillusioned at the lack of opportunities. I was pregnant at the time – so the future was not looking too good (we still hadn't made the decision to emigrate).

Then one day, around Easter time (April 1977), we were walking around a street in London and my

chin froze. That was the catalyst. I immediately said "I'd rather be out of work and warm than out of work and cold". So, we marched in to a travel agent and enquired on the cheapest way to get to Aussie. The agent found us a small ship (S S Singapura) sailing from Singapore to Perth. We bought an air ticket to Singapore and boarded this small ship. We had a huge cabin and all meals were eaten with the Officers and a few stray passengers. A love of rice was a distinct advantage!

We disembarked the ship in Fremantle around the middle of April and were met by ex PNG friends who were living in Perth. After a couple of weeks of fruitless searching for work in Perth, we bought a second-hand bomb of a car and proceeded to drive across the Nullarbor. Our final destination at that point was Brisbane.

Leaving Perth in good spirits at 9.15 on 3rd May 1977, troubles began 50 miles down the track. With engine boiling, we limped into Merredin. There we found an accommodating Service Station who changed the hoses. However, this didn't work so we had to stay a night and return to the mechanic to have the radiator back flushed. Finally, we limped to the next stop - Southern Cross - where an old mechanic who had been living and working there for 53 years, magically fixed our radiator.

I kept busy reading and crocheting a blanket and being amused by fellow Plains travellers, we kept passing. Some doing push-ups and others were cycling. Each time I needed a toilet stop — even though we hadn't seen a living soul for miles - when I was ready to crouch — sure enough along trundled a car!

Our "lovely" red Colt Galant car was now acting like an old rundown nag and loosing oil and misfiring. But we made it to Port Pirie on the 8th May.

Port Pirie to Adelaide was a relatively short drive. We hunted out a garage in Adelaide who gave us the unpleasant news that a collapsed piston was the cause of the misfiring. The friends we were staying with lifted our spirits and loaned us their more reliable car for a short tour of the Barossa Valley Vineyards. After the endless miles of sandy wastes and scrub bushes, it was refreshing to see well-kept fields, green grass and proper trees.

Adelaide – Hay 11.05.77

The drive to Hay was not to be forgotten. We were both tired and cold and because the car was heavily laden, the headlights were permanently on high beam even on the dip cycle. Added to this we were blowing exhaust smoke from our near

collapsed piston. This incurred the wrath of every oncoming motorist.

Hay – Griffith – Tumut 12.05.77

We visited the Griffith CSIRO Research Station where there was a possibility of a job that would suit Dave. We were told that formal applications would have to be made through government networks.

Leaving Griffith, we ambled towards the Snowy Mountains and started climbing hills. We had decided to cross to Canberra via the Snowies just to have look, even though it was a longer way around. In retrospect, we must have been mad with a sick car! Arrived Tumut early and booked into a motel thinking that we would have a good view of the Snowies in daylight the next day.

Tumut – Canberra 13.05.77

Set off early for Canberra in thick cloud but not to be daunted, we fully expected the fog to go away early. The higher we climbed the thicker the cloud became. It was also raining and freezing cold. Therefore, we missed the views. Dropping down to Cooma the sun was shining and everything seemed dry – in fact we were told they hadn't had any rain on this side of the mountains since March! On entering Canberra, we cruised around for a while not really knowing where we were going and admired the magnificent tree lined roads and avenues and general air of spaciousness and neatness.

We popped around to Duntroon Military Academy where Dave had applied for a job. It was fortunate that we did because they hadn't received his application, so another was completed. We stayed an extra day as Dave had seen two technician jobs at ANU advertised in the Canberra paper which he wanted to follow up on Monday.

Canberra – Sydney – Monday, 16.05.77

A day spent in Sydney catching up with friends from PNG and battling the Sydney traffic with a smoke belching car.

Sydney – Port Macquarie – Wednesday 18.05.77

Northern NSW was becoming flooded. After being diverted through Bulahdelah, at Taree the situation was looking grim. We had crossed one creek in the tracks of a large ute with men wearing oilskins on either side guiding us across. To make matters even worse the windscreen wipers were wearing out and scraping grooves on the windscreen. With the headlights still refusing to dip, Dave was turning off the lights when a car was approaching. By the time we reached Port Macquarie we were nervous wrecks having also negotiated two sections of unsealed roads and U bends. We were told that because of the flood, Coffs Harbour was completely cut off.

Port Macquarie – Tenterfield – 19.05.77

Because the Pacific Highway was flooded, we were guided to a secondary road via Walcha. Walcha-Uralla-Armidale-Glen Innes across hills.

Beautiful scenery: this detour was a pleasure. We stopped in at the Glen Innes Ag Research Centre where there was a job vacancy that may be of interest. Certainly interesting, it would have consisted of watching sheep fornicating and formulating better methods of doing this to improve stock lines. Not really Dave's line of expertise!

Tenterfield – Brisbane 20.5.77

Another pleasant day driving with the floods well behind us. We had an easy run into Brisbane. At last we reached our friends house and our hosts. Duntroon had tried to contact us via our friends as they wanted him to go next week for an interview – so fingers crossed.

3rd July 1977 – still living in Tarragindi

At last we can uncross fingers and toes and begin looking forward to a new life. Dave received a letter from the Capricornia Institute of Advanced Education in Rockhampton that he had been accepted as a Technician in the Chemistry Dept. Rockhampton could be the answer to all our dreams. We have heard it is a smallish place only 20 miles from the beautiful Pacific Ocean and coral reefs and is a busy and wealthy city, not scenically beautiful, but hilly and warm!! Everyone we spoke to who had been there said we would love it. We now were living with a holiday atmosphere

8th July 1977 – Brisbane – Rocky

Finally.... we were on our way to our "forever" home. We left in convoy – Dave driving the Colt (which had had a new engine fitted) and I was driving our Mazda (which had been shipped down from PNG). Not being used to long distance driving, we had stopped overnight in Maryborough – again with ex PNG friends.

At last after what seemed an eternity, we closed in on Rocky. I was observing the Berserker Ranges on my right and hoping we would be close to them — being the only hills we had seen for kms. I was not impressed with the drive into Rocky with the road bordered on both sides with Motel and other advertising hoardings. Then we crossed the mighty Fitzroy and followed our noses towards the CIAE. After making contact with his future employers we were booked in to the Oasis Motel where we proceeded to fill the room and any space outside with our boxes. The following days were filled with looking for houses. We did have a round trip to Yeppoon and Emu Park on the Saturday. Whereby I

nearly hugged myself to think we were so close to the lovely coast line with the magnificent views.

Well, that was 1977 and it is now 2019 in the intervening 42 years we have raised two children and had a relatively happy life and I can say we are now truly Rockhamptonised.
