


**Guest Speakers**

## Bird Watchers


One of our most active groups is the Bird Watchers.

For new members we have spare binoculars and can give you some pointers on their use. We try to ensure everyone gets a chance to see any birds sighted so please let us know if we can help.

In February the Group visited Bluff Point which is at the Southern end of Kemp Beach at Rosslyn. Ian's report follows:

At the February U3A meeting & Expo we had 8 new

members who signed up on the day. Welcome to you all! 'There were a small number of birds scattered through the dense forest and scrub canopy. We saw and identified Laughing



Kookaburras, Magpies, Scrub Turkeys, Torresian Crows, Black Faced Cuckoo-Shrikes and Mistletoe Birds plus some small birds flitting through the canopy but were too fast to identify. The weather was warm humid (25/30C) and cloudy. We had hoped to see Rose-Crowned Fruit Doves, Little



Shrike-thrushes, and Reef Egrets (at high tide) but not even a call!

There is a wonderful circuit of 2.3 km which takes you to the top of Bluff Point and back down to the Picnic grounds. The 180degree view extends

from Curtis Island to past Iwasaki's. The sign said a 600m climb! We all balked at such a climb and return; however, we went about 200m up each arm of the circuit in the hope of more bird sightings, with those who were less active spending their time back at the picnic grounds. We

had varying success walking up the pathways with Esther and Ian going the farthest – so they shared the Mountaineer Award. I have decided to increase my gym time so I can catch up.

After an excellent morning birding at a wonderful site for a couple of hours we had morning tea. A great way to socialize at a site beside the beach and enjoy a different type of venue.
